## A New Constitution

At the AGM late last year one item on the agenda was the changes to the constitution. This was deemed necessary for several reasons.

The ACNC, Australian Charities and Not-for-profits Commission, a federal body is the agency under which we now operate. Our original constitution was dated 30 October 1990, and under the jurisdiction of the Queensland Government. We need to have a modern format constitution to more easily obtain grants.

The ruling has changed now so that companies with yearly income below \$250,000 no longer need to be audited each year (unless it specifies such in their constitution) and with auditors fees more than doubling in 2021 we felt an urgency to update.

The model constitution proposed by the ACNC was used as the basis. We developed the objectives in the old constitution into appropriate purposes with advice from our solicitor and specific changes from the initial draft were

- Detail in Section 6 (8) relating to the Gift Fund
- Inclusion of Annexure A which details the rules relating to the operation of the Gift Fund

At a special general meeting held on January 29th, in Brisbane, the Chairperson proposed that the revised constitution be adopted. It was seconded by Joan and approved unanimously by all present. ## The Old Tank Stand

In better years this tank, high on its stand, would have been used in the 1950's/1960's to water Dave Gordon's original plantings in what is now The Old Eucalypt Way. It would have been filled by pumping water from the lagoon. Age has taken its toll and the strong westerlies last year almost blew it from its perch.

The tank stand itself has been home to our hives of *Austroplebeia australis*, an Australian native stingless bee, installed in 2010 by the late Allan Beil. This will continue to provide a home for the bees which have thrived there ever since.

Although still securely lodged on the stand, it was imperative to either corral or remove it. We did both. Rod, an old hand, devised plans for its removal. It took a morning to lever it from its stand and using ropes, drop it to the ground. The tractor then crushed it into movable pieces. Once loaded onto the Garden ute, it went for a trip to the refuse tip in Glenmorgan.

Not a job for one person but all in a day's work for Rod, Kevin and Julie. We will miss our Caretakers who have been so reliable and helpful through 2021/2022.

## **Generous Contributors**

Plant labels are an important part of the Garden. They educate and inform all who pause to admire, including the visitors, volunteers and caretakers. There has been a Gravograph engraving machine used in the Garden for many years. The machine is wonderfully engineered and continues to produce labels but it takes many hours to produce 50 labels. At present we are short of volunteers with time to spare and there is a backlog of around 600 labels that are required with that number growing every year.

Board members investigated a new Gravotech machine where the formatting is computerised and there are many options for size of label, font type and other unknown as yet, possibilities.

The Board was able to purchase one of these due to a generous donation from the Harding Family. It became available for collection in early February after several hours of tuition. What a difference there will be in the Garden as more and more plants have clear informative labels.

Such generous donations are quite necessary to keep the standard of our Garden where we would like it to be.

Signage giving visitors clear directions around the loop road is another priority this year, and stands to support the new boxes for the walk notes are important as the current log boxes are full of spiders, termites, beetles and other larger creatures seeking shelter. The new boxes have been made by a volunteer, Lloyd Akeroyd but they lack stands to hold them up for all to notice.

Donations can be made to the Gift Fund generally or for a specific purpose which supports the Living Collection, and of course, these donations are tax deductible.

Bill and Margaret Sugden recently donated a stainless steel BBQ and two 8 kg gas bottles. This will be used often and will reside in our new Camp Shelter.

## Vale Henry Nix, 1937–2022

The MPBG community will be saddened to read of the recent death of Emeritus Professor Henry Nix AO, a long time friend of the Gordon family and Friend of the Garden.

Among his many commitments and interests Henry was a foundation member and a past president of both the ACT branch of the Society for Growing Australian Plants and of the Canberra Ornithologists group, and initially it was these joint interests that brought him to Myall Park where it was discovered that his wife Katharine had been a student in Dorothy Gordon's art classes at Fairholme College, Toowoomba. An enduring friendship began which together with his keen interest in the Brigalow Belt brought Henry and Katharine back to the Garden many times.

Henry attended the Queensland Agricultural College before completing a degree in Agricultural Science at the University of Queensland in 1960. His studies soon saw him employed first as a science writer at the CSIRO, then Senior Principal Research Scientist in the Division of Water and Land Resources 1983-86. His career then turned towards academia, and he was appointed the Director of what is now the Fenner School of Environment and Society at the Australian National University. He subsequently became Visiting Fellow and Emeritus Professor.

Henry's expertise and interests covered a wide area of environmental issues, and he was active in and widely recognised by numerous organisations including Birds Australia (to whom we extend thanks for providing some of the following information in their obituary for Henry in a recent issue):

'Henry served on the Birds Australia Council from 1999, and was elected as President in 2001, our centenary year. In recognition of his service to our organisation, he was awarded Fellowship — our highest honour — in 2006.'

'Indeed, his work has been widely recognised, with Henry receiving a number of other prestigious awards, not least was Officer of the Order of Australia in 2000, and in addition, Fellowship of the Australian Institute of Agricultural Science, the J. P. Thomson Medal from the Royal Geographical Society of Queensland, a gold medal from the Queensland Agriculture College Council, the 1988 Urrbrae Memorial Award for outstanding contributions to Australian agriculture, and a gold medal from the Ecological Society of Australia in 1994'.

In 1995, Henry spoke as a supporter of the Garden at the grand opening of our Gallery and stressed the importance of MPBG's geographical situation right in the middle of the Brigalow Zone, one of the world's 35 climatic zones and unique to the area of Inland Australia running approximately from Collinsville in the north to Narrabri in the south.

He also made the point that the connection between art and science is much closer than most people realise, 'they are different ways of seeing the world and trying to understand the way the world is, but they have the same foundation in the wellsprings of human creativity, essentially very similar processes. What we have in the garden is a wonderful, preserved collection of plants which is important to botanical science, what I have behind me is a gallery which preserves and displays an artistic impression of the same collection and of other plants in the region.'



Some of us will remember attending paper making and book binding workshops at the Garden with Katharine, an accomplished artist and teacher. We take this opportunity to extend our heartfelt sympathies to her and family.

Vale Henry, the Garden has lost a valued and much loved Friend.

## The History of Myall Park Botanic Garden's Artwork



Apart from the Gallery's permanent collection of Dorothy Gordon's botanical paintings, the Garden is home to a wide variety of art works, some commissioned and others donated over time.

Future newsletters will highlight these with the first being the Leadlight Panels at the Gallery entrance. This was suggested by Nita C. Lester and commissioned after consultation with the Gallery architect, Brian Donovan, in 1993. It was to consist of a single panel with three equal descending sections each to highlight a Gordon Grevillea hybrid: Robyn, Sandra and Merinda.

Local artists and craftsmen responded enthusiastically. Interested artists met to discuss the possible designs. The resulting panel, decided on by Jane Bridle, Diane Hill, Nita C. Lester, Pat Mitchell, Carol McCormack and Joan Schwennesen was inspired by the context –Gordon grevilleas, lake and frog, and the blue-faced honeyeater. The honeyeaters are cleverly woven into the overall design but can you find the frog?

Grants were applied for and received from the Queensland Arts Council and the Regional Arts Development Fund. These grants provided funding for the employment of Dermot Clifford of Toowoomba, a craftsman and tutor of leadlight work. He provided workshops for all those who took part in the panel construction including Ken Green, Diane Hill, Sue Hughes, Nita C. Lester, Carol McCormack and Barry Mitchell.

The Sandra Gordon panel was finished by Dermot during the workshop sessions, and the two other panels were cut and partly constructed.

The Merinda Gordon panel was taken home and completed by Barry

Mitchell while the Robyn Gordon panel was completed by Nita C. Lester.

Ken Green assisted with the final soldering of the panels which were installed in February 1995 by Ron Brown, Ken Green and Barry Mitchell.

This beautiful panel stimulates the imagination of all who visit the Gallery and is a lasting credit to all those who took part in its evolution.

## NEW INFRASTRUCTURE

Through the Infrastructure Grant Program supported by Western Downs Regional Council, we were able to fund a large Camp Shelter. Our campground is becoming more popular every year and we thought a shelter with a large informative notice board would entice caravanners to meet other travellers and also volunteers, share stories and perhaps extend their stay and explore the area. We found a builder in Dalby very happy to construct it but the Covid pandemic interfered somewhat with transport issues, steel and other building supplies harder to source and increasing in price dramatically. Patience was required but it all happened early this year. The slab was poured, the shed erected and tank and pump installed. The electrician has added 4 or 5 more power points and so the camping area is larger and more powered sites are now available. The shelter also has two store rooms which are vermin proof. We will have an official opening on Spring Day. Many thanks to Western Downs Regional Council for their generosity and a great builder, Brendan Wirth.

## AND MORE NEW INFRASTRUCTURE



Another exciting addition to our Infrastructure is a 10. 585 kilowatt solar system on the roof of the Gallery. Michael King from Western Downs Solar organized this when we were fortunate to receive a grant from the Recycle Market Enviro Grants Program which is supported by Solar Operational Services and Western Downs Regional Council. It was a pleasure to work with Michael on this project and we would recommend this local company to anyone considering solar power.



### Plant Profile *Acacia dunnii*

*Acacia dunnii* naturally occurs in the Kimberley region of Western Australia and in the Northern Territory on shallow rocky outcrops. Its common name is Elephant Ear Wattle for obvious reasons, or Dunn's Wattle. Many acacias develop phyllodes (modified leaf stems) instead of true leaves. The phyllodes have fewer 'pores' and thus reduce water loss. The thick hairy phyllodes grow up to 45 cms long and 16 cms wide.

This species usually grows as a single stemmed shrub up to 6 metres tall. The trunk's appearance is smooth and velvet-white and the plant is rarely attacked by insects. There are several specimens at the Garden and when flowering, the rich golden-yellow flowers can be seen from quite a distance.

## Working Bees for the year

With Covid on the back-burner for many since the vaccination regime is covering more of us, the chance to attend working bees at the Garden hopefully sounds more inviting.

Our first for the year is the Glasshouse working bee to be held 13th—17th March.

Preparations are well underway and a grant was obtained from the Queensland Government Heritage Department to restore the structure.

Many Friends of the Garden have already indicated their willingness to attend our annual bee from April 24th - May 1<sup>st</sup>. Attendance isn't essential for the full time. Accommodation in The Quarters and Avochie Cottage are filling fast but there are always sites available for campers. Our camp shelter will be up and running by then and there are also more new camping sites available.

Tasks will be many and varied with fitness levels to suit all volunteers. We will be adding 80 grevillea species to what is becoming a significant collection of Proteaceae at the Garden. Visitors expect to see our grevilleas, but we are also continuing to expand our general species diversity.

As well we have the necessities of labelling, weeding, mulching, whipper-snippering, removal of trees and shrubs which died in the drought, checking and tidying Walks and Trails, seed collecting, permanent label placement and documentation of Garden species. In fact something to suit everyone.

The SOWN (Save our Waterways Now) group has allocated 20th—23rd May for their working bee. Work will continue in the Acacia Divisions which have put on amazing growth since last year, with the favourable seasons. This area has recovered remarkably-well after the drought losses and is well worth a visit. The Gumnut Walk will then be assessed and work will begin to devise new Walk notes and revitalize the collection.

The Queensland Eremophila Study Group are hoping to return in early August and would focus on extending the Eremophila display near the Garden for All Seasons. Species planted there survived the last drought with very few losses. The group had a very productive working bee in 2021 planting 111 eremophilas across from the Camping area.

Spring Day will be on Sunday, August 28<sup>th</sup>, and we usually have a working bee in the preceding week.

As usual, workplace health and safety issues must be followed by everyone and the Garden protocols observed at all times.

## GARDEN GLIMPSES

During a recent visit to the Garden there were noticeably more spiders than usual. To avoid being caught up in webs, one had to be focussed!



This beauty is a *Trichonephila edulis* or Australian Golden Orb-weaver. These spiders do not hide away during daylight hours as other Orb-weavers like to do. Apparently, in London's Victoria and Albert's Museum there is a cape made from the golden silk of 1.2 million similar spiders (released alive after the silk was harvested!)



This beauty is an *Argiope protensa*, part of the St Andrew's Cross group of spiders. They build small fragile webs, often attached to blades of grass or in this case, one of our plant cages.



When Kevin, the new caretaker, heard that the toilet at Avochie was not flushing, he investigated and found, among the mud and small rocks blocking the water inlet, many large frogs making themselves at home. They were relocated by the delighted guests but no doubt will be back soon!

Another visitor to the Garden commented that he had identified twelve different species of frogs. Unfortunately he did not leave a list .
